The Golden Roof, the symbol for Innsbruck, the Tyrolean capital, is famed throughout the world for its 2,657 gilded roof tiles. The gold-plating was commissioned around 1500 by Emperor Maximilian I (1459-1519). The royal balcony was later used for ceremonial occasions and also as a show of power.

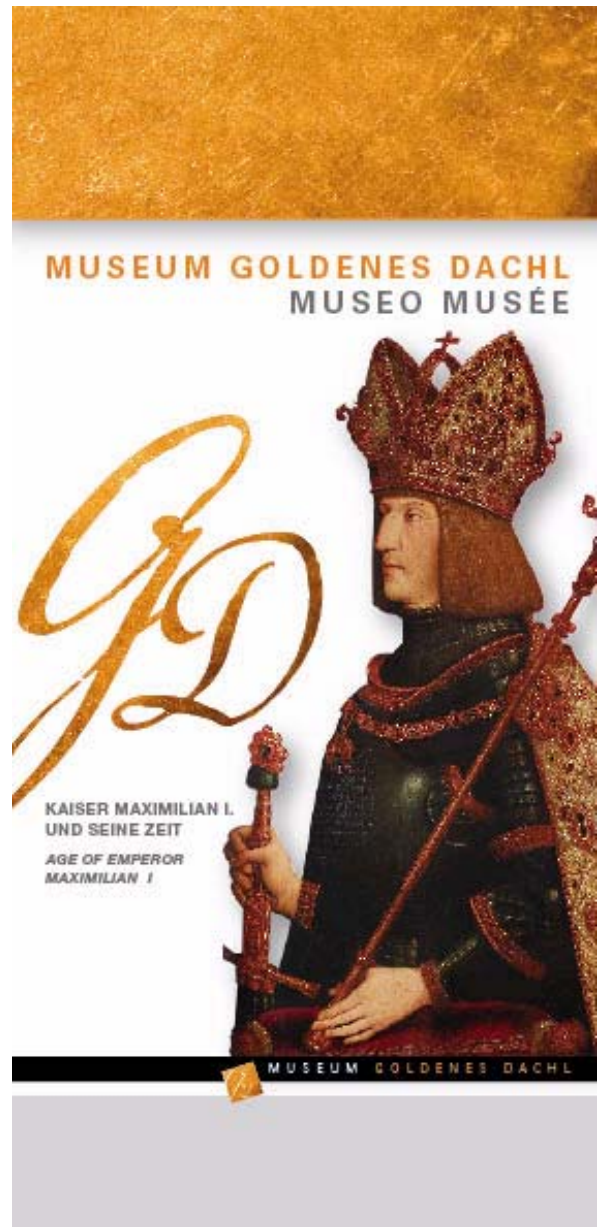
The Museum

The lively era associated with Emperor Maximilian I is documented in a varied and contemporary style throughout six exhibition rooms (350 sq.m). Visitors are invited to explore the exhibition hands-on. The latest technologies allow visitors to get much closer to late-medieval Tyrol.
